### New Bishop of Truro announced

Downing Street has announced that His Majesty The King has approved the nomination of the Rt Revd David Williams as the 17th Bishop of Truro.

David is currently the Bishop of Basingstoke, a position he has held since 2014. Prior to his consecration in 2014, David was a parish priest for over 25 years.

Ordained in 1989, David began his ministry as a curate in Ecclesall, Sheffield Diocese. He was a priest in Dore before being appointed Rural Dean of Ecclesall in 1997. In 2002 he became the vicar of Christ Church in Winchester and was made an honorary canon of Winchester Cathedral in 2012.

On his appointment, David said: "I can't tell you how excited I am to be coming to the Diocese of Truro. It's been an astonishing journey, enriched by so many people I've met on the way, people who clearly have been praying; people who've been seeking wisdom for the future of the church in Cornwall.

"What a remarkable place this is! I've worked in and visited Cornwall many times over the last 30 years and each time have come back feeling refreshed and renewed - both spiritually and physically.

I am, at heart, a parish priest. I want to continue working for the flourishing of local churches. The local church is vital to a local community. It's a place where we encounter God. It's a place where you're encouraged and comforted when you're in trouble. It's also a place where we are challenged and learn how to live in God's light.

"So, as I look forward to coming to this place, I wonder if I can ask you to pray with me, as I will pray for you, that we would be faithful to who God is and what he calls us to be. That we would travel together, would go on a new adventure together to discover the goodness of God, not in some distant place, but in our own localities. May the Lord bless you."

David, along with his wife Helen, has been warmly welcomed by the Bishop of St Germans, the Rt Revd Hugh Nelson, who has been acting Bishop of Truro since the departure of Bishop Philip Mounstephen. Bishop Hugh said: "I am delighted by David's appointment and am looking forward to welcoming him and working with him. His wealth of experience, love of people and deep faith will inspire us on, as we continue to work for a fruitful and sustainable church in Cornwall."

It is likely that Bishop David will be installed in Spring 2025 when a service to welcome him as bishop will take place.



# HOLY HOTDOGS!

Holy Hotdogs and Praise Him Pizza are just two of the items on the menu in Camborne on a Tuesday after school – and the kids are lining up to get some.

During covid, with a youth worker recently recruited and no clubs running. Camborne Cluster of Churches was wondering how it was going to continue reaching out to children, young people and families when the world was shut away. It was then that the idea of giving out hotdogs outside of the church came about.

This simple gesture quickly became 'Tea Time on Tuesdays' and once restrictions were lifted, families and teenagers were invited to drop into the church hall on their way home from school to pick up some tasty treats.

Fast forward almost four years and the church now regularly see 80 to 100 teens every week plus younger children with parents. The menu has grown too, and it now includes a variety of hot and cold food with homemade cakes being supplied by an army of volunteers from across the cluster's five churches.

Revd Rosheen Browning said: "It has just evolved. We tried things out and responded rather than imposed. We learnt that it's better to provide food people will actually eat instead of food we might personally consider 'healthy'. It's our job to share Christ's love, not take the moral high ground and share healthy



eating tips! Healthy Cornwall do come and join in with us on occasion!

"As well as the children we have got to know the parents and we know we're getting it right because they keep coming back for more."

Revd Graham Adamson, who was previously based in the cluster but is now deanery Mission Enabler and Rural Dean, says: 'We do get asked why they don't come to church on Sundays. I reply by inviting those asking to join us on a Tuesday! The truth is that it will all happen in God's time. It is not a straight line on a project graph. And it does beg the question, what would worship look like if they did?"

## PARISH SAFEGUARDING OFFICERS CELEBRATED

Almost 50 Parish Safeguarding Officers (PSOs) from across the diocese came together at Truro Cathedral for an event to acknowledge the work they do and raise awareness of the importance of safeguarding.

The event, which was also attended by Bishop Hugh Nelson, both Archdeacons, clergy and churchwardens, saw PSOs thanked for their hard work and commitment.

Speaking after the service, Blshop Hugh, said: "This was a perfect opportunity to thank our wonderful Parish Safeguarding Officers for their commitment and hard work in keeping our churches and communities safe. It was the first time we had done anything like this, and we will definitely be doing it again." Mandy Wells, Safeguarding Trainer, said: "It was, in my opinion, a very honest, supportive service that valued and congratulated the PSOs on their hard work and commitment to their parishes. Many of the attendees have been in the role of PSO for more than five years. They are the parish voice for encouraging all that need training and DBS as well as safer recruitment."

Mary Ann Trethewey, a Parish Safeguarding Officer in Renwyn with St Allen Parish, said: 'It was good to meet members of the diocesan safeguarding team and other PSOs face-to-face and to join in the service together. There was a really positive atmosphere, and I came away feeling valued and enthusiastic. The prayers, responses and hymns were very meaningful, and the singing was excellent."

Churchwarden Ann Bradbury who is also the Parish Safeguarding Officer in Landewednack Parish and St Ruan with St Grade Parish, said: "The Parish Safeguarding service was very special, tucked away in St Mary's aisle in the cathedral – it was not only lovely to be together in person with other PSOs but good to collectively recognise the 'eyes and ears on the ground' in our churches and communities.

"It was particularly reassuring to hear Bishop Hugh speak about hope, especially given the difficulties in the church at the moment."

## **BDC DEMANDS ACTION FROM NATIONAL CHURCH OVER SAFEGUARDING FAILINGS**

Following a meeting of the Bishop's Diocesan Council this week, members have written to churches, schools and communities in the diocese to share their views on the current situation facing the Church of England.

The letter is the result of a discussion at the meeting about the Makin report and the response nationally and locally. This session ended with the unanimous decision by the council. A letter will also be sent to the Archbishop of York and the Archbishop's Council.

You can read the full text of the letter here:

Over the last three weeks the safeguarding failures of the Church of England have been laid bare yet again.

We are hearing clearly from survivors and victims of abuse in this diocese and beyond that the national church response is causing intense pain. It has deeply and repeatedly hurt the people we are here to serve and has demoralised those who are trying to do the right thing in parishes, schools, chaplaincies and other places.

As the Bishop's Council we join our voice to Bishop Helen-Ann Hartley's prophetic call for us to be a different sort of church. A church that does not seek first to protect itself, but which champions those who are most vulnerable. A church where people with power are clearly and consistently held accountable.

Fundamental changes to the way the church works have been recommended and accepted again and again, but too often real change has been delayed or denied. The House of Bishops and Archbishops Council have failed to implement the recommendations made in numerous reports and reviews, and we call for urgent change and action to show that national leadership is ready and able to lead the changes required."

The Bishop's Council is grateful to survivors who contributed to this wording.

We continue to be grateful to you for your work to promote safeguarding and to show God's love in the world.

# OUTDOOR CHURCH DRAWS PEOPLE TOGETHER

Once a month in the Looe Valley Benefice worship takes a different approach, with the congregation finding themselves on village greens and by holy wells, in riverside spots in the town and cattle sheds on local farms. Outdoor Church is a different way of being church.

Outdoor Church is headed up by Revd Clive Gilbert, but is a team effort involving the entire benefice. Clive said of outdoor church: "It has drawn together people from across the benefice in a way that few other things can. People seem able to set aside their particular tradition and worship with others who appreciate different traditions."

With no expectation of format that sometimes comes with a Sunday service, perhaps people feel freer to engage with creation and creator more freely. The ethos of the outdoor church gatherings is to keep Christ at the centre, but to do so in new ways. Members of the benefice are invited to regular planning sessions to help think of new places and ways to worship in a way that by its very nature is a witness to the wider community.

Revd Clive points out that Outdoor Church has allowed some people who are not comfortable worshipping in our churches to be involved in church activities – thereby reaching beyond the normal congregations.



This has been particularly evident in village communities like Herodsfoot, where outdoor church services on the village green combining the love of Christ, the history of the village and the environment we worship in, has seen curious residents first come for a look at what was happening, and then stay and engage for the whole time of worship.

The lack of expectation of formality has helped to begin to develop new leaders too. People who had long sat in the pews and worshipped, have been invited to help lead sections, and have feel enabled and empowered to do so. Several people have made first steps into realising they can lead worship too.
